Hellgate Cheer Qualifies for Nationals But Unable to Attend

Hellgate Cheer was set to go to UCA (Universal Cheerleaders Association) Nationals for 2022. This was a huge feat for our cheer team, because it was the first time in Hellgate history this has happened.

Sadly, after all the hard work the team went through over the past year, it was decided they were no longer going to compete, due to growing concern about the spread of COVID.

Hellgate Assistant Principal and Athletics Director Nick Laatsch said the decision was made because of "surging cases in COVID and the logistics of traveling out of state with a team."

He went on to say, "We weren't quite sure the best way to handle the situation if a student were to become sick on the trip. How they would be cared for and how they would get home. What would they have to do in terms of isolation? Would their parents have to come and get them?"

According to Hellgate cheer coach Caroline McCormick, "The team [had] been preparing for Nationals since July, when we went to the UCA summer camp."

Qualifying for Nationals has many steps, said McCormick. To qualify, the team first had to do the UCA summer camp, which they attended in Idaho last summer. Then they had to submit a cheer for the online regional competition. After the long process they were accepted.

They had to raise about \$26,000 before they got to compete in Nationals, but now they are using these funds for a few other things. They are going to use some of this funding for a cheer camp this summer as well as to fund a competition they are competing in next month.

The team worked extremely hard to qualify for Nationals. "I [was] pumped for Nationals. My freshman self never saw it coming," said

cheer captain Jacoba McAdams.


This hasn't been the only COVID-related struggle the team has had to face over the past year though. According to assistant coach Oceaana Hammond-Weggman, they have had problems with masking during cheer and attendance due to the pandemic.

According to McCormick, "They're all great kids, they are super dedicated, they come ready to work, they put in the time outside of practice too, and I think they've become their own little family, and they are super supportive of each other, which really helps us as a team."

The team continues to move forward and make big strides in their goals. "We're finally being recognized as our own sport," said cheerleader Elizabeth Rose.

UCA was founded in 1974 by Jeff Webb with the goal of incorporating high level athleticism along with crowd leadership. Now it is the largest cheerleading camp company in the United States. They train over 180,000 cheerleaders every summer, with over 3,200 sessions/camps across the U.S. UCA also founded the American Association of Cheerleading Coaches and Administrators (AACCA). This is focused mainly on cheerleading safety. UCA holds many competitions throughout the year and all over the country. They all lead up to the National Championship in Orlando, Florida.

Hellgate's team is now striving to go to Nationals next year, after all of the hard work they put in to qualify for this year's competition.

Hellgate Happenings: How Do They Happen?

Every Monday after the announcements in second period, teachers are asked to pull up YouTube and watch that day's Hellgate Happenings. During the 3-5 minute video, Hellgate's Student Government tells that week's news and about upcoming events, such as games, dances, or drives.

Hellgate Happenings started when principal Judson Miller, Student Government advisor Melissa Henthorn, and last year's Student Body President and VP, Avery Maxwell and Waverly Winterer, came up with the idea of going on Google Meet every Tuesday and presenting the announcements live. Because of audio and quality issues, the idea was switched over to video form where the videos could be edited and perfected before going out.

The videos are recorded, scripted, and edited by the school's officers. Videos are filmed on Fridays at lunch, then edited over the weekend. Student Body President Griffin Kinch, who edits the videos, said he "usually edits them on Sundays, waiting for added information usually about events from Friday or Saturday."

"I have definitely had some late nights on Sundays, which would be my least favorite part of HH. Twice, I have had my computer crash in the wee hours of the morning while I am exporting the video. Both times, I lost about 45 minutes of work that I had to go back and redo. Maddening and slightly mind-numbing, those were pretty brutal nights and following mornings."

"I learned how to use Adobe Premiere Pro from the internet over the summer, excited by the prospect of Hellgate Happenings, and having enjoyed forays in iMovie for Spanish projects. It's weirdly a lot faster to edit on PP than iMovie once you get it down. I haven't fully gotten it down either - I think anyone who actually knows how to edit could see that," said Kinch.

The information presented in the videos, such as upcoming games or fundraisers, is either found by Student Government or students reaching out, such as the toy drive and food drive in December, where members of National Honor Society had reached out to Student Government and requested to be put in the video. Any student or club can email Student Government at their email, hhsstudentgov@student.mcps-

mt.org, and request to be in a video.

Having your club or fundraiser promoted in the video is a great way to gain interest and attention, and has been successful for several events, such as the Struttin for Stuffin walk which donated all proceeds to buying Thanksgiving meals for Missoula County families in need.

"We have never cut or rejected things that people have requested to put in. It's a great way to reach the entire school," said Kinch, "I think that seeing them in video gave people a more personal feel to the project than a poster or intercom announcement might have."

Recently they have been showcasing Hellgate artists in a new segment called Hellgate Art. Cooper Johnstad, Student Government's secretary, is currently running the segment and interviews artists about their creations. "The problem is that no one wants to reach out to us and email their art, so we have to seek them out. It's been a cool way to meet people and find the reticent gems of our arts community," said Kinch.

"Teachers should play them because they contain vital information for students to see. Community and belonging are essential, especially with the amount of stress put upon high schoolers," said Kinch. "It is engaging and (sometimes) funny, (hopefully) bringing students in, holding their attention, and spreading important information. We try to keep the videos as short as possible, and understand teachers not wanting them to eat up class time, but find that the benefits that the videos provide outweigh the cost."

Events highlighted in Hellgate
Happenings include Poetry Out Loud,
the school's plays, most recently Little
Women, and All State Orchestra.
Every week something new happens
at Hellgate, and to have it recorded

Reimagining High School

Looking at the 83 high schools in Montana, it may not seem that we are in a crisis. The average high school graduation rate is 90 percent, but that number may be misleading. I know this, because I am a high school senior in Montana.

Many of the graduating students will not be prepared for college. According to an Achieve report from 2016, of the 39% of Montana's Class of 2014 who entered the Montana University System, almost a quarter were placed in remedial math courses. There are graduates who are left out, who, in this age of ever increasing automation, will not be able to find a job. High school is supposed to prepare us for the future, but I'm scared.

What am I supposed to do in the future if high school doesn't prepare me for life? How am I supposed to get a job? I'm told to go to college, but how will I pay off the debt?

These questions and more don't have easy fixes. They need real, substantial changes to the model of high school itself, creating a personalized and curious system rather than our current one-size fits all model. Essentially, what would it look like if we made high school a little more like college?

I caught a glimpse of this in Hellgate's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The current block schedule has blended some of the benefits of the longer class periods from last year's hybrid model, with the ease of continuing classes without substantial interruptions. The strict bell schedule of seven short periods a day, every day, is unsustainable and drives burn out. It increases fatigue and reduces productivity, especially for classes at the end of the school day.

Another key recent change is the pushed back school start. While last year we were lucky to not start until 10:00 a.m., the late start time of 9:00 a.m. we now use is still a big improvement. The ability to sleep in late and have some free time in the morning before school is extremely beneficial for students, especially teenagers who need a lot of sleep. My morning routine used to be waking up and rushing out the door. Now, I have time to eat breakfast or catch up on homework. This delayed start gives teachers extra prep time and students don't fall asleep in class as often as we did when school began before the sun rose. As we move forward, these new schedule changes should stick around.

Although there are massive drawbacks to learning from home, the increased comfort of beds, couches, and chairs is something we should bring into the classroom. These changes will spur creativity and create an environment that's more conducive for learning, as simple as they are. A shift away from the routine of sitting in a plastic chair at a small desk for hours on end, could be just what is needed to re-energize students and help us feel more comfortable while we learn.

I've started embracing that spirit in several of my classes. In English, when we have silent reading days for our literature circles, I've been reading on the floor. This simple change of sitting on the floor by my chair, with my back against a wall, keeps me engaged it definitely makes it easier to read 19th century Russian literature. The newspaper and yearbook shared computer lab has a couch, a popular spot for students to sit and work from. If anything, these changes make students more productive. As office spaces move towards more ergonomic designs to improve worker health and productivity, schools should follow.

We also need to reframe the concept of homework. Rather than constant busy work, due day after day, homework should be used

to break down the walls of formal learning. Filling out pages of study guides, regurgitating information from a textbook, or solving endless versions of the same math problem with different values, does not significantly improve my understanding of concepts. Beneficial homework assignments prioritize creative thinking and application of concepts. Most importantly - they're often less time consuming, and should be assigned less frequently. Homework would have much more power if it was used to promote exploring one's passions and interests, and to connect real world action to classroom learning. Rethinking homework and shifting the conversation around what it should be is an important step in making schools more inclusive.

The typical four year graduation requirement plan needs to change. Each student should be able to design their own graduation plan in consultation with their counselor and family. If a student wants to focus on primarily STEM classes or art classes, let them

I fell in love with journalism freshman year and chose to take newspaper electives all four years of high school. And on top of the 2.5 social studies credits required for graduation, I have an additional 4.5. As a result, due to the strict graduation requirements of MCPS and the advanced classes I'm taking, I was unable to find space in my schedule to take a second year of P.E. Ultimately, I had to ask the administration to get a physical education credit waived in order to graduate on time. To be able to explore my passions, I've had to push myself to the limit and work harder than any high schooler should be expected to.

In this day and age, to get a good job it is more important to demonstrate abilities like creativity, leadership, communication, and analytical and interpersonal skills. Graduation requirements written for the workforce of 30 or 40 years ago do not apply to the world today. While it is important that all graduating students demonstrate competency with concepts such as basic math skills and U.S. history knowledge, by the time students have reached high school they should be able to invest most of their time in classes they find stimulating. By focusing on courses of interest, students will be more involved in school and more willing to learn and think creatively.

For certain classes, there should always be an option to "test out," or demonstrate mastery of the course material on day one. This would prevent the scenario where students who could have passed the class on the first day are stuck for a year, while students who need more time are rushed through concepts before they are ready so the teacher can keep the class together. Just like in college, if a student does not need to take a class, they shouldn't. Schools should set expectations that students will graduate in three to five years, rather than assuming all students will be at the same level of readiness after exactly four years.

In this scenario, it's also important that students are allowed to learn and demonstrate understanding in their own way. Students are all different and their brains work in different ways. For schools to be fair, tests shouldn't be biased towards certain learning styles, and teachers should provide options for students to learn in multiple ways. A universal method of teaching content to everyone does not work for everyone, contrary to what our current education system would like to believe.

As a student who has taken many AP and IB courses, I believe we can learn a lot from the International Baccalaureate organization. My IB courses focus on skills, not content. We're taught to strive to be learners and achieve the Learner Profile: to be knowledgeable, principled communicators; balanced and open-minded risk-takers; reflective and caring inquirers and thinkers.

This curriculum is such a stark contrast to so many other classes I've taken in high school, and I believe schools all across the United States can learn from this model. Focus on the student as a whole and promote ways of thinking instead of cramming as much content as possible into our brains.

In my reimagined school, teachers aren't the only ones doing the grading. I believe students should be given a chance to grade their teachers too. We should get to give teachers grades based on how well we feel we are being taught, and how engaged and supportive our teachers are. Teachers, in turn, would receive pay raises each year based on their grades - pay raises they desperately need and deserve.

This would fix so many problems. Students would get a voice—they surely know more about which teachers are good than administrators can guess from test scores and passing percentages. Teachers would be motivated to teach better, and they would be paid better. Happier teachers lead to better education and happier students.

My last suggestion—this is a big one—would be to do away with summer break. So much of each school year is used to reteach material that was forgotten over the break. Learning loss over the summer is real and a big problem, especially for underserved populations who do not have as much access to summer programs.

To replace summer break, I propose that schools institute more frequent short breaks. Think spring break, but one break every six weeks or so. I believe this concept of rests from school but not resets would benefit students by avoiding the burnout that comes from them having to be enrolled in school for nonstop five day weeks, for months in a row.

Achieving these goals will not be easy—not by a long shot. In public schools like Hellgate, we need more money from the government. The money exists, the budgets just need to be readjusted to better fund schools. A well educated population is the most important variable to ensure a bright future for a nation. Lower rates of unemployment, a more active economy and a more intelligent population—who could object?

I believe the most important thing we need to achieve in education is for schools to look at students as people—not as figures or graduation rate statistics. If schools were measured on a student by student basis, they might be more motivated to bring each student to success. Schools need to serve as a leveling ground, not a place of further division.

We need to think creatively. The pandemic has forced schools to operate in new ways, and we need to keep reimagining education. Let's lean into the change and build schools that work better for all.

A Journey From Carefree To Concussed

As I lay on the gym floor, the world spun around me. I tried to comprehend what had just occurred, but my mind was as blank as a bulldog's thought process. Attempting to convince the teammates hovering around me that I was okay, I stood up, but couldn't walk in a straight line. Feeling as if I could projectile vomit at any time, I stumbled down to the athletic trainer's office.

If you haven't had a concussion yourself, you most likely know someone who has. According to NPR News, one in five teens have reported being diagnosed with a concussion and around 6% have been diagnosed with multiple. On Oct. 18, 2021 my whole life changed after two heads collided during a volleyball practice.

I suddenly turned from human to vampire. The sunlight and loud noises worsened my constant migraine, and my seven-year volleyball career came to an abrupt ending. Simple tasks that elementary school kids could complete became difficult. I couldn't focus on any homework, reading tormented my brain and don't even think about asking me to close my eyes unless you want me to fall off balance.

As a very academically inclined student, being told that I shouldn't attend school until my headaches and nausea subsided was devastating. I hated falling behind in my classes, and watching my grades drop was awful. I'm the kind of person who believes that if you aren't two steps ahead, you're behind, and I was so incredibly behind. However, this is the moment when I stepped back and looked at my current situation. There's a point in life where you get so caught up in school or work that you forget to be kind to the one body you have.

Against my instincts, I put away all of my homework and focused on rehabilitating my brain. One of the hardest things about a concussion is that the people around you can't see into your brain to see how it's healing. A concussion is all about how you feel, and nobody else can dictate that

For about a month, my days were filled with sitting on the couch, going on five-minute walks and helping my hurt brain recover. Unfortunately screen time made my headaches worse, and even the slightest amount of physical activity made me nauseous. I believe that although my concussion limited a lot of things, it also allowed me to reflect

on what I really enjoyed doing. I started painting, playing with my animals more, and enjoyed short walks throughout the day. It's important to find the things you enjoy, and surprisingly a concussion helped me with that.

I have dealt with several injuries because, as a libero, my position in volleyball, I constantly hit the floor when I dive. However, I could slowly see the progress while recovering from those injuries because they were visible. With a concussion, it feels as if you are never going to get better. But time heals all wounds, and I began feeling better and doing more normal activities after about a month.

Another thing I learned is that grief makes all symptoms of a concussion heighten. In the midst of my concussion rehabilitation, my grandmother passed away. This kind of grief was some of the hardest I've ever had to deal with, and it seemed to make my head pounding and nausea increase. If you struggle with depression and are dealing with a concussion, the symptoms are very similar. It's important to talk to someone if you are undergoing these stressors, because it makes you feel as if you're sinking in quicksand and will never be able to escape.

When I was finally able to return to school, I felt like a kindergartener again. My IB English class and AP Statistics class were undoubtedly the most difficult. It would take me around ten minutes to read one paragraph, just to forget it again. Everything seemed to fly over my head, and I wondered if this is what kids with ADHD felt like.

However, I didn't just jump all the way back to school. I first returned to my easier classes, such as watercolor. Once my symptoms were not prevalent during those classes, I added on another class, and then another until my full schedule was back. I found out how important it was to talk with the school counselor and school nurse. Returning to school irritated my symptoms, and occasionally I had to leave my classes due to my symptoms heightening. It was also of utmost importance that I told my teachers how I was feeling, because like I mentioned earlier, nobody around you, except yourself, knows how you feel.

A little over a month passed, and I was slowly getting back into the swing of things. I was finally able to drive again and school was becoming slightly easier. However, one thing that I didn't expect was that my studying skills and organization skills changed. I found myself having to plan out every little detail of essays and homework, and my studying techniques were altered.

According to Medical News Today, the majority of concussion symptoms are alleviated within two weeks to a month, but approximately 20% of concussions last longer than six weeks. Lucky me. Concussions still aren't completely understood by medical professionals today, but some factors that are said to make symptoms last longer are grief, being a woman, academic standing prior to the concussion and where you were hit on the head.

Concussions are an injury that I didn't take as seriously before I endured one myself. Through my experience with a concussion, I've learned:

- 1. Be patient and rest.
- 2. Sunglasses are your best friend.
- 3. Take your concussion seriously.
- 4. Keep in touch with your friends and be social, but don't do any stupid teenage things.
- 5. Only you know your limits.

I think that it's important to spread awareness of concussions and the effects of them because of my experiences. Don't be afraid to reach out to medical professionals about your symptoms, and remember that concussions take time!

This show isn't for everyone. I especially don't think it's healthy for kids under the age of 16 to be watching



Social media was created for the purpose of showing off that your life extends beyond the safety of your own home; to share events, parties, even


regular hangouts with others. This original idea of social media has been alienated with Meta's intentions for the future: encouraging their users to initiate contact through technology, instead of having conversations in person.

Hellgate Dancers Traveled to UAE to Perform at World Expo

In December, four current Hellgate students traveled with their dance company, Rocky Mountain Ballet Theatre (RMBT) to Dubai, United Arab Emirates (UAE).

They were invited to perform at the Dubai 2020 World Expo, representing the United States, as part of RMBT's Ballet Beyond Borders initiative.

The 2020 Dubai Expo is the most recent in a legacy of mega-events to improve humankind's knowledge and demonstrate scientific, technological and social progress, dating back to the first World Expo in London in 1851. This year's theme is "Connecting Minds, Creating the Future," where visitors can experience "the making of a new world at the greatest showcase of human brilliance and achievement."

Hellgate seniors Ruby Jenni and Naomi Byrne, and juniors Amare Swierc and Dimitri Govertson-Donaldson were four of the nine dancers who traveled to Dubai alongside their dance director Charlene Campbell Carey, choreographer Walter Barrera, pianist Karen Carreno, and Native American dancers Al Plant and Kya Rae Arthur.

RMBT is a unique dance company in that they train in Missoula and travel all around the world for performances. Their academy dancers range in age from 14 to 18, and train in ballet, contemporary, tap, flamenco and hip-hop.

Jenni has traveled abroad many times with the company. "I personally have been on two trips to China supported by the state department as well as dance training intensives in Austria, Portugal, Mexico, and Canada. And trips to participate in cultural festivals and the like in Russia and China," she said.

For the 2020 Expo, they were invited by the U.S. State Department to travel with diplomatic status and perform

as cultural performers for the U.S. Pavilion. Their dances aimed to "embody the energy, enthusiasm, and spirit of the Great American West."

"Despite traveling all over the world, [in Dubai] we had the most diverse audience we've ever had," said Jenni. "Our performances reflected some of the things we've done in the past that the US department wanted us to bring to the Expo."

More than 192 countries were represented at the Expo in different pavilions: some countries had large pavilions while some of the smaller countries shared buildings. According to the Expo's website, visitors can "explore 192 County Pavilions, treat yourself to dishes from every corner of the world, unleash your inner techie and experience entertainment unlike any other."

While the dancers spent plenty of time rehearsing and performing, they still took time to explore. "We had a few hours a couple of times to visit pavilions, getting our Expo passports stamped. Each pavilion exhibited the cool things each country was doing as well as some had art installations and cultural exhibits," said Jenni.

"We got to see the crazy exhibits at the Saudi Arabia pavilion and visit South Korea's pavilion, have sushi at Japan's pavilion, see Milan fashion week dresses and a recreation of the David in Italy's pavilion," she said. "Plenty of surreal experiences. The expo was newly built and laid out in the shape of a flower. So you could walk in circles and circles, cutting across walking roads for hours."

"Everywhere you went there was music playing out of speakers that would change depending on what section of the expo you were on; it pulled together the ambience in a wonderful way."

The RMBT dancers performed three times on the main expo stage in the U.S. Pavilion, called the Jubilee Stage. They also performed an additional five times on the small U.S. Pavilion stage under the replica rocket.

Other presenters at the US Pavilion included paralympians, professors from prominent universities, best-selling authors, and even singer Alicia Keys. Jenni added, "Due to it being super crowded and our bus coming to pick us up we got to see about two pretty cool minutes of her. I hear, however, that the State Department told our dance director that we got better ratings."

The Expo was originally scheduled for October 2020 through April 2021, but it was postponed for a year due to the COVID-19 pandemic (the name 2020 Expo was retained for branding purposes). In order to ensure a safe experience, strict COVID-19 protocols were followed. All of the dancers were required to be fully vaccinated to travel in and out of the UAE, and to wear masks at all times.

While the performances themselves were the highlight of the trip for all of the dancers, they also spent their time in Dubai immersing themselves in the local culture. When they weren't staying at the hotel the US State Department paid for, they visited the 124th floor of the Burj Khalifa - the tallest building in the world - and wandered through traditional souk markets, exploring the vendors selling spices, gold, clothes and more.

"We also spent a night in the desert in a program that replicates the traditional bedouin camps that people lived in for centuries in the Arabian desert. We had camel's milk and smoked chicha (hookah/tobacco) and had food made in the traditional ways, absolutely delicious and a totally surreal experience none of us were expecting. Sitting at midnight in a camp with no lights on, by the fire, under the stars was truly something special," said Jenni.

"It was a great trip and interesting to be in a country whose native culture is so different from our own in America. Many women were wearing burqas and we had to be careful to not touch in public as displays of affection are off limits in the UAE," said Jenni. "It was hard because dancers are super physically affectionate with one another."

The dancers returned to the US on Dec. 16 after spending 10 magical days in Dubai. "On the main stage it was always at sunset and on an outdoor stage the sky was incredibly beautiful as it changed. It was certainly a picturesque performance despite the fact that the physical intensity of the hour-long shows was insane," said Jenni. "It was super fun to be there... an absolutely insane experience that I would not hesitate to do again."

Bare Bait Dance's Springboard '22

Springboard is a performance put on by Bare Bait Dance (BBD) every year. The performance is a choreographic showcase with guest choreographers, company dancers, apprentice dancers and guest dancers.

Bare Bait Dance is a contemporary modern dance company in Missoula. It was founded in 2011 by Joy French, the artistic director. According to their website, the company strives to, "increase the availability of contemporary dance to both the Missoula community as well as rural Montana communities which are largely under served in the performing arts, build an accessibility to dance by producing concerts that speak directly to contemporary western audiences and by fostering more possibilities for dance education both in the public schools and our communities, [and] collaborate directly with local artists to create interdisciplinary dance productions."

Their main goal is to "strengthen the Montana dance community by providing paid performance jobs to highly skilled professional dancers, nurturing their creative work as choreographers, and facilitating opportunities for them to expand as teachers, present performers and choreographers from around the region and nation in order to cultivate a richer appreciation for contemporary dance and dance field as a whole."

BBD was supposed to perform Springboard for two consecutive weekends but had to delay their opening due to COVID-19 concerns. As they had to limit their performances to one weekend, Jan. 21-23, they performed one show on Friday and added two shows for Saturday and Sunday. The performances were held at the West Side Theater. BBD had to limit their capacity to a third of what they can typically do. This meant about 50 people could attend each performance.

The company choreographers for Springboard 22 were Maeve Fahey, Joy French, Tara McFarland, Tiki Preston, Grace Nolan, Ruby Roberts, and guest choreographers Faith Morrison and Ashley Zhinin. I was one of the performers for the show as well as Lizzie Archer, Mackenzie Black, Shenoah Curley-Wildshoe, Maeve Fahey, Cate Gibbons, Audrey Kurz, Tara McFarland, Grace Nolan, Tiki Preston, Ruby Roberts, Jessica Shontz and Regan Tintzman.

Bare Bait Dance has an Apprentice Program that "invites Missoula's most talented young dancers to train, create, be mentored by and perform with the Company." I am one of the three apprentices for the '21-'22 season, along with fellow Hellgate students Audrey Kurz and Cate Gibbons. These dancers participate in the seasonal performances and attend weekly company classes and rehearsals on Sundays and Tuesdays.

Audrey Kurz, a senior, has been an apprentice for three years. When asked why she does BBD she said, "It's just one more opportunity to dance and perform which I love! I love the community and being able to dance with the company members in a professional setting is pretty cool and a great experience for us apprentices."

Cate Gibbons, a junior and first year apprentice, said, "I dance with BBD to get the opportunity to learn from and dance with such talented dancers." When asked how Springboard went, Gibbons replied, "I think Springboard went very well and my favorite part was definitely getting to dance in front of a live audience again. I think it was overall a really good experience!"

Zora Ybarra, a junior at Hellgate, attended the performance. She said, "I went to Springboard because all of the Bare Bait shows are eye-catching and I love being with the dance community as well as watching all my friends dance." An Unofficial Ranking of Every Live-Action "Spider-Man"

Over the course of the winter break, a little movie called Spider-Man: No Way Home came out. It did fairly well in the box office and earned 1.8 billion dollars globally and is now the 3rd highest grossing film of all time, with "Avengers Endgame" and "Star Wars The Force Awakens" taking the 1st and 2nd respective spots. In preparation for such an event, I watched for the first time ALL eight previous live action Spider-Man movies over the course of one weekend. I enjoyed all of them, some more than others. This list is my own and will probably be different from your personal list. It will be ranked from worst to best, although none of these movies are truly bad, I just didn't enjoy them as much as others. I will also be including plot points to all the movies, so there will be spoilers for every movie except for No Way Home. I will, however, add to the online version of this article the plot details for No Way Home after it gets a home release on disc/digital so that you can go see it in theaters.

8. The Amazing Spider-Man 2



This was Andrew Garfield's second movie as Spider-Man and I enjoy him as Spider-Man. He nails the quippy, sarcastic aspect of the character. He has great chemistry with everyone, including his then-girlfriend and costar, Emma Stone, playing Gwen Stacy. The plot revolves around Max Dillon (Jamie Foxx) who essentially develops a parasocial relationship with Spider-Man after the superhero saves Max from being hit by a car. After falling into a pit of electric eels and absorbing their

powers, we are treated to a very blue and very evil Max. At the same time, Harry Osborn (Dane DeHaan) returns from Europe and needs Spider-Man's blood to save himself. To help him, Peter goes on a quest to find out more about his parents, a plot point which is still never fully resolved as we learn that Peter's dad deleted his files to prevent Oscorp, a corporation, from weaponizing his research. Harry goes insane after trying to cure himself and becomes this universe's version of Green Goblin, capturing Gwen Stacy and dropping her for Spider-Man to save. He is just a second too late and Gwen hits the pavement, dying immediately. After a period of Spider-Man disappearing, he finally returns to save the city. This movie was okay, but the script wasn't the best and set up too many things that never got a proper payoff. A third movie was planned with Andrew and would have been the launch of something similar to the modern MCU, however, due to the lackluster box office performance, Sony pulled the plug. Unfortunately, that means that we may never see the end of the "The Amazing Spider-Man" movies like we did with the Tobey Maguire or Tom Holland movies. Instead, we get to enjoy the movies that already exist, and this one has a brilliant soundtrack conducted by Hans Zimmer and is definitely a good movie, but not the greatest in the Spider-Man lineup.

7. Spider-Man 3



This 2007 movie was the conclusion of the Sam Raimi trilogy starring Tobey Maguire as Spider-Man. In this movie, Peter Parker and his girlfriend MJ (Kirsten Dunst) have a wedge driven between them because Peter starts to enjoy the company of Gwen Stacy (Bryce Dallas Howard). MJ splits up with Peter and he becomes the host of the Symbiote, an outer space alien that enhances the negative aspects of its host. This leads to what has been

named "Bully Maguire," a meme of Peter Parker in a black suit walking down the street and dancing. The sequence is goofy, but was made to be that way. The Symbiote separates from Peter and attaches to Eddie Brock (Topher Grace) and introduces us to this film's Venom. At the same time, Harry Osborne (James Franco) is preparing to become the next Green Goblin to exact revenge on Spider-Man because Osborne believes Spider-Man killed his dad, Norman. For years, no one told him what had happened, so Harry has a change of heart and helps Peter defeat Venom and then dies. Oh right, and Sandman (Thomas Haden Church) shows up and makes amends with Peter because the death of Uncle Ben was retconned to have Flint Marko kill him. This movie has too much going on and unfortunately, isn't that interesting when broken down. It's a good "turn-your-brain-off-and-enjoy" kind of movie, but there are better movies in the Spider-Man lineup. The soundtrack is excellent and is conducted by Christopher Young, who replaced Danny Elfman, who scored the first two films. I think that it had too much going on and didn't know where it wanted to go. It's still a fun movie though.

6. The Amazing Spider-Man



This was Andrew Garfield's first foray as Peter Parker and it did really well. There have been some complaints that Peter in this movie was "too cool" and shouldn't have been a skateboarder, but I enjoyed it. Andrew is incredible and his relationship with Emma Stone definitely contributed to the chemistry they shared on screen. In this movie, it starts with Peter obsessing over finding out more about his parents, leading him to meet Dr. Curtis Connors (Rhys

Ifans), is a coworker of Peter's dad, who's interested in genetic engineering to help amputees like himself. To achieve this, he and his team study lizards. After Uncle Ben (inevitably) dies, Peter becomes Spider-Man to find his uncle's killer. With the threat of his funding being cut, Dr. Connors takes the drug himself and regains his missing arm. As the drug takes effect, he turns into a massive reptilian creature and becomes the Lizard. He attacks a bridge and Peter arrives and saves everyone before Lizard escapes to the sewers. Peter is invited to dinner with Gwen's family and learns that her dad, George Stacy (Denis Leary), hates Spider-Man. Peter reveals his identity to Gwen and goes to track Lizard who is planning on weaponizing the drug that made him that way, turning all of New York City into Lizard people like him. Spider-Man

stops him, but before he can, Stacy dies and changes his mind on Spider-Man. This is a good movie that set up something great with Andrew, but was undermined by its lackluster sequel. The action scenes are cool though and Garfield is directed to fight like a spider, wrapping Lizard up in webs and there are improved stakes with him having to make more and more web fluid. The soundtrack was done by James Horner and revamps the original Danny Elfman theme. It's a good movie and different from the others, but is judged too harshly most of the time. I love the Andrew Garfield movies because of how different they are from the Raimi and MCU films. Andrew Garfield plays Peter as if he were a normal kid and while they are over the top comic book movies, they ground themselves in reality, something that gets added onto by the MCU films.

5. Spider-Man: Far From Home



This was the second solo Spider-Man film within the Marvel Cinematic University and Tom Holland's fourth time donning the suit for the MCU. A lot of the plot revolves around having already seen a majority of the previous MCU films, something I haven't done, so I know I've missed some important plot aspects. Anyway, the film starts with Nick Fury (Samuel L. Jackson) and Maria Hill (Cobie Smulders) fighting an Elemental, an alien figure with each one representing the elements. To help

them, Quentin Beck (Jake Gyllenhaal) shows up and is recruited by Fury to help should they attack again. On a field trip to Europe, Peter decides to reveal his attraction to MJ (Zendaya), only to be thwarted by an attack from another Elemental, this time, the Water Elemental. Once again Quentin Beck arrives and saves the day. Peter meets up with Nick Fury, who gives him Tony Stark's glasses, which have access to Stark Industry weapons, including E.D.I.T.H. Beck claims that in his dimension, The Elementals killed his family and he was performing a crusade to rid the multiverse of them. After the Fire Elemental, the final one, attacks, Peter decides to leave E.D.I.T.H in control of Quentin Beck, who goes by Mysterio now. As it turns out, Beck had worked under Tony Stark (Robert Downey JR) and was fired for being "unstable." As it turns out, The Elementals were all highly advanced holograms and projections and now, Mysterio has access to dangerous military drones and orbital weapons. He launches them in an attack on London, which ends with Mysterio being shot in the chest by a drone. Then we get one of the coolest scenes in the movie. Mysterio surrenders the glasses back to Peter only for a single gunshot to ring out. The film cuts and the real, mortally wounded Mysterio has his arm held up as Peter uses his Spider-Sense to stop himself from being shot. The Mysterio laid up against a wall and surrendering the glasses was another projection and fades away as the real Mysterio dies, saying the most ominous last words, "People will believe anything." The film ends with Mysterio releasing a doctored video of Peter calling the drones to attack and revealing that Peter Parker is Spider-Man. This movie was fun because of all of its twists and turns. Although some of the dialogue was kind of bland at times and the fight scenes were a little too reliant on CGI, the performances were great. The soundtrack, done by Michael Giacchino, was what you expect from a modern Marvel Movie. I enjoyed this one a lot.

4. Spider-Man: Homecoming



This was the first solo Spider-Man movie in the MCU and opens up right after the events of 2012's The Avengers. Aiden Toomes (Michael Keaton) is on the cleanup crew after the alien invasion in New York. He loses his job after Tony Stark's Department of Damage Control takes over, forcing Toomes to steal alien technology and become the arms dealer, Vulture. Peter Parker and his friend Ned Leeds (Jacob Batalon) are on the school's academic decathlon team, but Peter

quits to be Spider-Man and, hoping to eventually join the Avengers. Ned finds out and helps Peter track Aiden after finding Aiden's associates trying to sell arms to Aaron Davis (Donald Glover). Aiden finds Spider-Man and drops him into a lake, only to be saved by a remote controlled Iron Man suit. Tony Stark warns Peter not to fight Aiden and focus on helping the citizens of New York. Peter is able to place a tracker on one of the criminals and rejoins his Decathlon team for a trip to DC, because Aiden is in Maryland. While in DC, Peter and Ned remove the tracker Tony built into his Spider-Man suit. Toomes attacks a Damage Control truck and Peter ends up stuck inside of a warehouse, missing the Decathlon Tournament. He realizes that the weapons are alien technology and after a power cell from one of the weapons explodes, he has to save his classmates from inside of the Washington Monument, including his crush, Liz (Laura Harrier). Peter tracks Aiden again to a Staten Island Fairy and the arms deal is interrupted by the FBI and Spider-Man. The weapon malfunctions and splits the Ferry in half, making Spider-Man web the two halves back together. Iron Man appears and saves the ship by welding the two halves. Tony Stark appears in person and reprimands Peter, taking away his suit. Peter lives a normal life and even gets to go to a dance with Liz, whose dad is Aiden, a really cool twist that you don't see coming. In one of the coolest and most tense scenes, Aiden drops the two off at the school dance and figures out Peter is Spider-Man, making a deal with him and saying that because he saved his daughter, Aiden will let him go. Peter leaves the dance and follows Aiden, who plans on stealing Avengers weaponry from a plane. In his original, homemade suit, Spider-Man crashes the plane on a beach and saves Aiden from his flight suit, which would have exploded. Tony Stark decides to make Peter a full-time Avenger, which Peter declines. This movie is a great introduction to a different Peter Parker than Andrew or Tobey portrayed. Again, it requires some previous knowledge of the MCU, so I'm sure I missed more plot details, but stands on its own as a good Spider-Man introduction. Michael Giacchino revamped the original Spider-Man theme from the '60s and uses that in a brand new and excellent theme. This is one of my favorite Spider-Man movies and absolutely separate from the Raimi and Andrew Garfield films. These are the most grounded in reality and different because of that. They do require previous knowledge of the events of the MCU in order to truly "get" everything, but they stand perfectly fine enough as their own movies, which makes them enjoyable for everyone.

3. Spider-Man



The first Tobey Maguire and Sam Raimi movies, this movie tells the origin of Spider-Man. Peter Parker is an awkward teen who works for the school newspaper. During a school field trip to Columbia University, Peter is bitten by a genetically modified spider and gains spider powers. Norman Osborn (Willem Dafoe) fails to land military funding for his experiments and uses them on himself, leading him to go insane. Uncle Ben (Cliff Robertson) urges Peter to be

responsible, leading to the famous "With great power comes great responsibility." Instead, Peter signs up for an underground wrestling tournament and fights a Macho Man Randy Savage cameo. After getting cheated of his proper earnings, the fight promoter gets robbed and Peter lets the thief go, leading to Uncle Ben being carjacked and shot. Peter chases after the killer, only to find it was the same thief who robbed the promoter. In fear, the thief backs into a window and dies after falling through. Osborn attacks his opponents at Quest Aerospace and kills them. This is the first episode of the Jekyll/Hyde life of Osborn and Green Goblin. After Goblin takes over, Osborn doesn't remember any of it. Osborn is forced out of his company and assassinates the board that made the decision to force him out, only to be thwarted by Spider-Man. Goblin captures Spider-Man and tries to convince him to join his side, and Spider-Man refuses. During the fight, Peter gets his arm cut. Peter, MJ, Norman, and Harry are all invited to Thanksgiving dinner by Aunt May (Rosemary Harris). Norman sees the cut on Peter's arm and figures out his identity, leaving Osborn to plan a way to get to Peter by attacking his loved ones. Green Goblin bombs Aunt May's house and leaves her hospitalized. MJ, who was dating Harry at the time, comforts Peter by holding his hand. Harry tells his dad that Peter loves MJ and Norman figures out his next plan. He captures MJ and forces Spider-Man to choose between saving MJ or a train car full of children. Spider-Man is able to save both and is taken to an abandoned building by Green Goblin. A brutal fight ensues and Norman Osborn reveals himself as troubled, begging for forgiveness. He positions his glider behind Peter and hurtles it towards him. Peter dodges and the glider impales Norman, killing him. Peter takes Norman back to his house and is seen by Harry, who now believes Spider-Man murdered his father. At Norman's funeral, Harry swears to get revenge and MJ reveals her feelings for Peter, but Peter decides they can only remain friends so that she is safe. This movie is a great introduction to Spider-Man and was the start of the modern superhero movie. Everyone is perfectly cast, especially Tobey Maguire and Willem Dafoe, who play these creepy and over the top characters so incredibly well. You don't need too much about the hero to understand and enjoy the movie, and has an excellent soundtrack done by Danny Elfman. The movie is fantastic and one of the most influential superhero movies, holding the record for most tickets sold for a superhero/comic book movie until The Dark Knight in 2008. I love the Raimi trilogy because of how campy and comic book-like they are in how they're shot and edited.



2. Spider-Man 2



The second of the Raimi trilogy and Tobey Maguire films, this film is arguably the best of them. Peter Parker is slowly losing his powers and at the same time, losing MJ who is now engaged to astronaut John Jameson (Daniel Gillies) and son of Peter's boss J. Jonah (JK Simmons). Peter is introduced to Dr. Otto Octavious (Alfred Molina) to interview him for a college report. Otto is attempting to harness nuclear

power and to safely do so, constructs an AI controlled set of robotic arms. The arms are a really cool construction of puppetry and were completely practical. At a demonstration of the reactor, it fails and kills Otto's wife, driving him insane, allowing the AI controlling the arms to control him. Spider-Man shuts the reactor down and retires after losing his powers for good. Peter assumes a normal life, but after the bank is robbed by Otto, Spider-Man returns and we are given the famous train sequence. Otto, now Dr. Octopus, destroys the controls of a train full of people and leaves Spider-Man to save them. Thinking quickly, Spider-Man attaches several webs to the surrounding buildings to save them from falling into a river. The event causes him to pass out and be saved by the citizens who learn his identity. They all promise not to tell. Harry Osborn, still believing that Spider-Man killed his dad, recruits Doc Ock to find Spider-Man and in exchange, Harry will give him the fuel he needs to run his fusion reactor. Harry learns Spider-Man's identity and is convinced to help stop Octavious. Unmasking himself, Peter convinces Otto to shut the reactor down and regains control of the arms, sacrificing himself by taking it into the East River. MJ learns that Peter is Spider-Man and decides to be with him again. This movie is fantastic and is definitely worth the watch. It's one of those rare movies where the sequel is better than the original and has the greatest villain with Doctor Octopus, played fantastically by Alfred Molina, who seemed to be the favorite of everyone who reviewed the movie. This film is one of the best Spider-Man pieces of media and earns its respect.

1. Spider-Man: No Way Home

I have to review this one differently. I can't talk about major plot points that happen within the film, however, I will discuss the plot points we know based on the trailers and marketing for this movie. After the events of Far From Home, and Mysterio releasing his real name, Peter Parker is living a crazy life and seeks the aid of Dr. Strange (Benedict Cumberbatch) and asks for everyone to forget his identity.

The spell goes awry and the multiverse collides, bringing back Green Goblin, Doc Ock, Sandman, Lizard and Electro, the main antagonists of the two previous film series, played by their original actors. This was the second album that Swift has re-recorded in order to own master recordings of her first six albums that were released in association with Big Machine Records (BMR). In 2019, Scooter Braun bought the company Big Machine Records for \$300 million, and therefore obtained the masters to Swift's music. Swift then left Big Machine in 2019 and ended up signing on with Universal Music Group (UMG).

As part of her new deal with UMG, she now owns the Masters to the music she releases. There are 30 songs on the album, however, I didn't rank the song "Ronan", as it is a tribute to a family that suffered the loss of their four year old son.

29.) We Are Never Ever Getting Back Together (Taylor's Version)

There's nothing really wrong with this song, it's a very iconic pop song. On the original 'Red' album, it's one of Taylor's first number one hits in the U.S., but it can get old pretty quickly. Again, it's not a bad song but it's just not as memorable.

28.) Stay Stay Stay (Taylor's Version)

The only reason this song isn't at the very bottom is that you can actually do CPR to the beat, which is quite helpful. It's a fun song overall, but the lyrics are just not up to Taylor's standards.

27.) 22 (Taylor's Version)

TikTok Trends Influence Popular Culture

While scrolling through TikTok you hear many different people, sounds, and songs. Trending audios change every week, with a new one popping up and going viral every day. 

Popular singer and rappers such as Nicki Minaj, Jason Derulo, and Kesha, often have songs going viral, such as "Backstabber" by Kesha, which recently blew up, and B.O.B and Nicki Minaj's "Out of My Mind," which blew up due to Minaj's rap.

TikTok is a great way for new artists to promote their music, with the possibility of going viral being one video away. Artists are discovered every day, with some of the most famous being Meghan Thee Stallion, Lil Nas X, whose "Old Town Road" was an instant hit, and Doja Cat. "With my experience in the last two years of coaching from when I wrestled in 2012, I would say girls wrestling has changed miraculously by the amount of girls wrestling. When I wrestled there were only three girls in our state that wrestled, and now at one singular tournament there can be up to 160...I think more girls have come out because the non-intimidation of wrestling guys; I think that that plays a lot into it, the fact that they get to wrestle girls."

The wrestling program has experienced some changes with the increase in girls wrestling. "I think that the program has changed [with] more equality as far as girls when it comes down to tournaments. I used to change in a linen closet, that's where we weighed in at, and now girls get to be in the gym weighing in with the boys, which is a huge change, there's an actual locker room that we can go into," said LaBare.

Referee Omaste Win echoed the changes that came as the numbers of female wrestlers increased. "Just 2 years ago girls were wrestling boys to even compete at the state the level. A lot has changed over the years starting in 2017 when the number of girls started to increase, it started to become normalized when a girl would be wrestling for an all guys team in Montana."

Hellgate wrestler Bee DePuy said, "You may ask why I do wrestling, the main reason is because it makes me feel good about my body. I feel strong and powerful. The relationships you make on your team are also amazing. Wrestling for me also gets a lot of built up anger and emotions out - the aggressive act of fighting someone and pinning them to the mat is oddly therapeutic. Wrestling is the hardest physical and mental thing I've ever done. You have to be strong headed and strong willed. The growth I've made since I started wrestling is one of the coolest things to me."

Another wrestler, Liz Gray, said, "I found a sport that is physically and mentally challenging, and there is no set way for the matches to go. Through wrestling I have learned that no matter how hard you may work there is someone working harder and in order to beat the best you have to train harder than they are. Wrestling is not for the faint hearted. Wrestlers may be physically strong but they are also mentally strong."

All involved have strong hopes for the future. "With the second sanctioned season getting ready to come to an end for girls, I can tell you the number of girls increased, [they] are able to have whole tournaments as well as have a conjoined state with the boys at the metra in Billings. I don't think the program is changing, I think it's improving and still has a long way to go. More girls are getting exposed to the world of wrestling, they are becoming passionate about the sport. With more girls joining, many programs around the states will build a legacy of girls wrestling and I just hope it continues for years after," said Win.

Rise in River Surfing Threatens the Community at Brennan's Wave

As you may know, river surfing has become

a rising sport among the river community in Missoula. Origins of the sport are widely debated, and while it is impossible to know where the sport truly originated, river surfing on standing waves has been documented as far back as the early 1970s in Munich Germany on the Eisbach.

In North America, river surfing most likely originated on the Snake River near Jackson Hole, WY. Nevertheless Montanans are some of the earliest river runners to pioneer the sport.

For those unfamiliar with how it works, the wave is formed from a high volume of water rapidly running over a drop on a constricted section of river. The quality of the river wave varies based on many factors, primarily the amount of flow and water level as it runs over a drop in the river.

In Missoula, most surfers ride Brennan's Wave. It used to be a dangerous hydraulic only played on by kayakers. In 2006, debris was removed from the site and rocks were placed in the river making

two waves that many Missoulians have grown to love ever since.

In recent years, many new surfers have been drawn to Brennan's wave wanting to join the sport. While many surf breaks on the coasts have developed a serious localism vibe, the Missoula river community has remained accepting and inclusive of anyone wanting to experience the excitement of the outdoors. As other surf spots around the globe have been overrun by crowds, the Missoula river community will soon be put to the test on whether we can remain supportive, or if we will succumb to frustration and become sour towards newcomers.

Ollie Long has been river surfing for a long time and noticed a large increase in the number of surfers at Brennan's Wave "in recent years," and thinks that expanding upon different wave options could be a solution to beating the crowds.

Long said, "There is a point where you would get too many people but sometimes it's the more the merrier but there are things you can do to prevent overcrowdedness, like other waves and making sure people get their time on the wave."

Henry Naughton, a sophomore at Hellgate who has been surfing for two years, said, "It's a fairly intimidating atmosphere at first but once you get to know the people, they really come around to you and you just have fun out there." Although he was naturally intimidated at first, Naughton's perspective shows the extent to which everyone is nice to each other from underclassmen at Hellgate to old men.

Cyclocross Racer Elsa Westenfelder Competes Worldwide

When thinking about a high school athlete, some sports that come to mind may include volleyball, football, basketball or track. However, rarely does the sport cyclocross pop into one's head. Elsa Westenfelderblows high school sport stereotypes out of this world as she navigates her bike on both paved and unpaved roads, conquers hurdles while lifting her 15lb steed, climbs stairs and hills and traverses other obstacles.

Ever since the high school junior was eight or nine years old, Westenfelder was immersed in this marriage of mountain biking and road biking. She said, "We have a great cyclocross community here in Missoula, and it was easy to get into because of that."

Westenfelder decided to immerse herself in the unique sport, "because it's incredibly physically demanding, but also very technical, with many different features like tight corners and off-camber descents. I really enjoy pushing myself physically and mentally, and cyclocross is a combination of those."

The modified road bike used for cyclocross has skinnier, knobby tires and slightly different geometry. Because of the rough terrain, if Westenfelder requires a bike with a different tire pressure or if her bike is having

mechanical issues during the race, another bike is onsite ready for her to exchange and continue her trek.

The closed circuit races last anywhere from 40 minutes to an hour and her season lasts from September to February. Although the season is limited to these five months, Westenfelder trains throughout the entire year. Whether she is riding a stationary bike, running or Nordic Skiing during the winter months or mountain biking and road racing during the spring months, Westenfelder focuses on "getting in lots of miles and time on the bike."

During Hellgate's winter break, Westenfelder competed at the highest level possible for her age group at the Namur and Dendermonde World Cups, the Zolder-Heusden Superprestige and the GP Sven Nys in Belgium. She competed in five races during the three and a half week time span and placed 26th at Namur, 20th at Dendermonde, 14th at Zolder-Heusden and 12th at GP Sven Nys.

After racing in Belgium Westenfelder was asked to compete with Team USA in the Cyclocross World Championship in Fayetteville, Arkansas on Jan. 29. She placed 24th for her 16 and 17 year old age group and 9th for 16 year olds. Westenfelder has many aspirations for her future in cyclocross and stated, "Next year I'd like to travel to Europe again for the Christmas Block and race there. I'd also love to make the Worlds team again." Her main goal for the sport is to improve her European race results because, unfortunately, cyclocross isn't an Olympic sport. However, she said, "In the long-term, a World Cup or World Championships podium would be very cool."

In a sport that is this physically demanding, the thought of giving up would run through the minds of almost any competitor. However, Westenfelder pushes through these barriers and said, "During a race, I always try to focus on what's in-front of me. It can be mentally really difficult to keep pushing, but at the finish you can always be happy if you give it your best effort in the race."

Although Westenfelder seems to be made for the world of cyclocross, she said, "My biggest influences in the sport are probably my dad and my coach. They have been super supportive this year, and traveled all around

the US for races. I definitely would not be where I am now without their support."

Westenfelder is an inspiration for not just high school athletes, but also anyone working to achieve their athletic goals. If everyone pictured the small goals she sets for herself, such as, "Catch the rider in front of you" or, "Go as hard as you can up this run-up", then more individuals would be able to achieve not only their athletic potential, but also lifelong potential.

and watched for a longer period of time and because our society is filled with sexist undertones?

Women's soccer versus men's soccer is a great example of that. The women's US team has won many World Cups and always places high in the tournament while the men's has never gotten that far. The women's World Cup series brings in more revenue than the men's, yet they are still paid significantly less.

Kevin Green replied to a comment asking why women were still paid less, after they won the World Cup, saying, "REVENUE. Why is this so hard to understand? It is embarrassing." But he was incorrect when looking at the numbers, and contradicting him helps the fight for equal pay.

Statistically the "Women's USA soccer players make about \$25,000 - \$85,000 per season, while the average is around \$40,000 for women," according to the John Jay Office of Undergraduate Research. Professional soccer salaries for men are much different. They range from \$50,000 to \$300,000 per player, per week. The average appears to be around \$50,000 per week, with many players earning above and beyond that.

This has gone on for a long time in our society, and it is time for a change.

There is the same level of physical exertion and commitment to the game from the women, so it is only fair that there is significant change in the pay gap.

There are many recurring things, like the women's soccer US national team, that have brought the eyes of many fans, and still there are men making twice if not three times as much for losing a game, than women for winning.

As a competitive female athlete, along with many inspirational players and people in our society, there is a communal agreement that change needs to be made. Girls have dreams to become professional athletes and work as hard as possible to get there, so to give them less than they deserve for putting in the equal amount of work is practically the definition of unfair.

As women and girls continue to strive for excellence, there should be a reward. Professional female athletes have to have other jobs just to stay up financially, while trying to stay in shape and keep up with their sports season. They have to go to school and take academically challenging classes so there is a cushion for when they stop playing competitively, and they need another job because their athletic career did not offer enough support.

For example, to make a living as a women's soccer player, you have to sign sponsorship deals with big companies like Nike and Adidas, to bring in steady income. Co-captain of the US Women's National Soccer Team, Megan Rapino states, "Someday a women's goal will be worth as much as a man's".
